RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE GOLD RIDGE RESOURCE CONSERVATION DISTRICT (GRRCD) PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY, RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY EXECUTIVE ORDER N-29-20, ISSUED BY GOVERNOR NEWSOM ON MARCH 17, 2020, AND AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF GRRCD FOR THE PERIOD July 21, 2022 August 20th PURSUANT TO BROWN ACT PROVISIONS.

WHEREAS, the GRRCD is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of GRRCD's legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the District's legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the District's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, such conditions now exist in the District, specifically, a state-wide state of emergency was proclaimed by the Governor of the State of California for public health and safety due to the dangers of COVID-19, restricting gatherings and ordering social distancing measures for all businesses, government offices, etc.; and

WHEREAS, both State and Sonoma County Health Officials have imposed social distancing requirements and recommended that government meetings not be held in person due to the increased danger of COVID-19 virus transmission when people from different households meet in enclosed spaces; and the Delta variant of COVID-19 even amongst vaccinated individuals has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the District that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the District, and desires to proclaim a local emergency and ratify the proclamation of state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency, the Board of Directors does hereby find that the legislative bodies of the GRRCD shall conduct their meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that

such legislative bodies shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953; and

WHEREAS, the district's legislative bodies have met and continue to meet through internet videoconference (Zoom) that is accessible to the public on any computer or device that has internet connectivity and allows the public to participate in the meetings as they would at in-person meetings;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF GOLD RIDGE RESOURCE CONSERVATION DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. Proclamation of Local Emergency. The Board hereby proclaims that a local emergency now exists throughout the District and that meeting in person would risk the health of the public, staff and directors through potential spread of COVID-19 through unavoidable close contact at in-person meetings.

Section 3. Ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency. The Board hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.

Section 4. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Executive Officer and legislative bodies of the GRRCD are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 5. Effective Date of Resolution. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of August 20, 2022, or such time as the Board of Directors adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the legislative bodies of GRRCD may continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.

Financial Summary for April 2022.

This report covers the first ten months of the current fiscal year. Since many of our grants bill out only quarterly, revenue for these grants in April has been estimated.

In the **Statement of Net Assets** GRRCD's **accounts receivable** is \$768,912 plus a **retention receivable** (grant funds withheld pending closure) of \$50,834 for a total of \$819,746 from grant activity. The unexpended portion of our advance payments to date totals \$168,448 and appears as deferred revenue (a liability) on the balance sheet. This represents all advance payments from various grant sources less expenditures to date.

Our county bank balance is in the positive at \$167,210. Our payroll account at Exchange Bank has a positive balance of \$47,750, and a small account at the same bank is holding \$473. Gold Ridge's prepaid expense of \$6,800 represents prepayments for liability, workers compensation and truck insurance for the remaining six months of the current fiscal year.

The **accounts payable** balance is \$474,489 compared to \$451,793 in the prior month. Other liabilities include a credit card payable of \$1,852, deferred revenue as noted above, paid time off liability (compensated absences) as well as funds owing Cal Pers retirement, payroll taxes and our voluntary 457 retirement if unpaid at month's end. The Statement of Net Assets also includes the status of our pension liabilities (GASB report) which is recorded each year with our audit.

Our **equity** this month is at a positive \$367,467 with capital assets of \$22,819, fund balance of \$95,622 and net income of \$249,027. It reflects the receipt of \$320,386 in Federal Covid 19 Relief Funds, and an account receivable for the \$60,000 theft of our funds that the county has agreed to repay to us and remains outstanding.

The Board has indicated that it will determine how the Covid Relief funding is to be allocated. Just over \$11,000 was previously approved to fund wage increases for the current year.

The Statement of Operations for April reports \$2,146,686 in revenue and \$1,885,416 in expenses (including reimbursements and principal payments on the truck) for a net gain of \$249,026. In total, we have booked approximately 65% of budgeted grant revenue plus 97% or property tax revenue. Total revenue from all sources is 82% and includes our Covid Relief Funding. On the expense side we have spent 73% of budgeted expense year to date.

If we were to exclude of the \$320,000 in relief funding from our analysis, we would show a net loss in our regular operations of \$72,361 year to date.

It is also important to note that 10 days of payroll in April did not pay out until May 6 and totals \$24,000. This increases our year-to-date losses to \$96,000.

Definitions:

- Statement of Net Assets (the balance sheet) lists all our assets, both cash and noncash:
- Assets include our cash in bank, funds expected from our grant activity but not yet received ("accounts receivable" and "retention receivable"), prepaid expenses, and the value of our physical assets.
- Liabilities are made up of money we owe to vendors, cash advances from grantors, credit card and payroll liabilities.
- Equity is the difference between our assets and liabilities or net worth as an organization.
- Net Income is the difference between assets and liabilities in this Fiscal Year
- Statement of Operations shows income and expenses for the current period.

Summary

Approval of the Executive Director to enter into agreement with the County of Sonoma for the LandSmart Community Grazing Program (grant #207) for \$355,513

Background

Gold Ridge and Sonoma RCDs have been selected to implement phase II of the LandSmart Community Grazing Program funded by the Ag + Open Space District's Vegetation Management Grant Program in 2021. This project supports interested neighbors or community groups to utilize grazing to reduce fuel load and make their communities safer in the face of wildfires. Exposure to this type of vegetation management and community support of grazing will add a cost effective and needed tool to manage vegetation not only to reduce fire risks but also to improve biodiversity and manage vegetation in a more carbon beneficial manner. This project also continues to serve previously burned properties for invasive weed removal and fuel load reduction in preparation for future post-fire recovery activities. The continued project builds upon knowledge gained during the pilot project that is currently being implemented providing valuable information on how to make the program work including an expansion of grazers working with the RCDs and knowledge of several additional landowners who wish to be involved in the program.

The LandSmart Grazing Program will become a model for future grazing opportunities for landowners after fires and become part of the RCD's arsenal for assisting with both fire resilient vegetation management and post-fire activities. The RCDs will solicit interest and support community groups to work with contract grazers to support community targeted grazing.

Discussion

Locations for grazing support will be throughout Sonoma County. Applications will be prioritized by the high fire risk areas where there is a close proximity to at-risk, densely populated, tribal affiliation or underserved communities. We will also be using the newly developed CWPP Project Ranking Tool.

Priority areas will be targeted for outreach as we aim to support multi-beneficial projects in the areas most vulnerable to wildfire. There is an inclusive and transparent selection process on what land participants and grazers will receive support.

LandSmart Grazing is a rebate program, where the selected land participants contract with a grazer for services and the RCD reimburses them. We will reimburse applicants up to 85% of contract grazing fees or up to \$20,000 per applicant. To increase the project's inclusivity, we request cost share on a sliding scale. Our goal is to cover 50-80% of the cost of the contract grazing. Participants may request 100% of costs to be covered if need is described.

The RCDs will file a CEQA Notice of Exemption for each site funded in this project. No other permits are anticipated.

Project Timeline: June 2022 through December 2023.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: Please provide a brief summary of the Project (1-2 paragraphs)

LandSmart Grazing Program is a pilot program designed to support interested neighbors or community groups to <u>utilize grazing</u> as a way of reducing fuel load and making their communities safer in the face of wildfires. This project also aims to serve previously burned properties in order to remove invasive weeds and reduce fuel load in preparation for future post-fire recovery activities.

Through Phase I funding from Ag + Open Space, Gold Ridge and Sonoma RCDs connected contract grazers to landowners with the help of the UC Cooperative Extension's <u>Match.Graze</u> program in the hopes of facilitating a smooth and effective reduction of fire-fuels. We encouraged landowners and land managers with 4-100 acres of grasslands or woodlands to apply for this subsidized opportunity. The majority of our funds have been prioritized towards areas of high fire risk where there is a close proximity to at-risk, densely populated, or underserved communities. While all funds from this pilot phase have been awarded, the RCDs are seeking additional funding to expand the program.

1. **Project Administration** (*Please include contractual arrangements, technical lead, CEQA compliance.*)

- a. Contractual arrangements: The RCDs have contracted with 4 of the 5 selected project participants through a Landowner Access Agreement. We modeled the agreement on the Rebuild North Bay Foundation's North Bay Forest Improvement Program (NBFIP), a regional incentives program to help small non-industrial forest landowners (<500 acres) conduct fuels treatments and forest restoration projects on their properties. The structure of this agreement is a rebate program, so the applicant contracts with a grazer for services and the RCD reimburses them. We provided applicants with a list of contract grazers that applied to our program with information on livestock type, services offered and rates, etc.</p>
- b. Technical lead: Kari Wester is serving as the technical lead for Sonoma RCD and William Hart is serving as the technical lead for Gold Ridge RCD.
- c. CEQA compliance: We have filed CEQA NOEs for projects about to begin and have worked collaboratively to develop this pilot program.
- d. Wildfire Mitigation Specialist: We are working with a certified wildfire mitigation specialist on selected properties to (1) identify wildland fire fuel types and associated concerns and hazards to the built environment; (2) determine anticipated wildland fire behavior based on site conditions; and (3) analyze structure ignition potential in the wildland/urban interface using a science-based approach. A report is generated as education material for the site and includes (1) a mitigation plan using treatments appropriate for the wildland/urban interface; (2) fuel modification plans in order to reduce wildland/urban interface hazards; and (3) appropriate mitigation strategies for the wildland/urban interface see attached report.

The purpose of this program is to increase contract grazers capacity to offer grazing services within Sonoma County. Eight grazers applied for and were awarded mini grants. Items funded by this program needed to have a purchase date after October 22, 2021 to be eligible.

4. **Challenges** (Describe any challenges and/or opportunities encountered and how they will be addressed, including any changes to the anticipated schedule as described in the Work Plan.)

We are considering how to best support land participants with long term grazing. Prescribed herbivory grazing for one year can make a measurable impact to fuel load reduction, but that impact has a limited time span. In the NRCS conservation practice standards for prescribed grazing, the lifespan of the practice is one year. Further, the NRCS advises, "success of the practice shall be determined by evaluating post-treatment regrowth of target species after

sufficient time has passed to monitor the situation and gather reliable data. Length of evaluation periods will depend on the woody species being monitored, proximity of propagules (seeds, branches, and roots) to the site, transport mode of seeds (wind or animals), and methods and materials used." Source.

We believe that there is an opportunity to build upon an existing, trained labor force of contract grazers who are responding to the escalating threat of catastrophic wildfires in the County. While a goal of this project is that project participants will have increased comfort and incentive to pursue future grazing, it may be cost prohibitive for some. In order to address the need for sustainable vegetative treatment and to stimulate the generational shift towards management of our landscape, we need to 1) provide technical assistance and educational resources to landowners about community supported grazing; 2) provide mini grants to increase contract grazers capacity to offer grazing services within Sonoma County; 3) support jobs that are in demand and will continue to be over the coming decades.

5. **Labor Sources and Volunteer efforts** (Who has assisted in completing your grant goals, how has the community been involved, etc.)

Labor for this contract has been primarily RCD staff with help from the joint RCD and Fire Safe Sonoma GrizzlyCorps Fellow. Many partner agencies assisted with outreach including Sonoma County Farm Bureau and UCCE Sonoma. We have engaged with several land participants that were not funded or did not apply in time for the first round including local fire safe councils and several neighborhood groups.

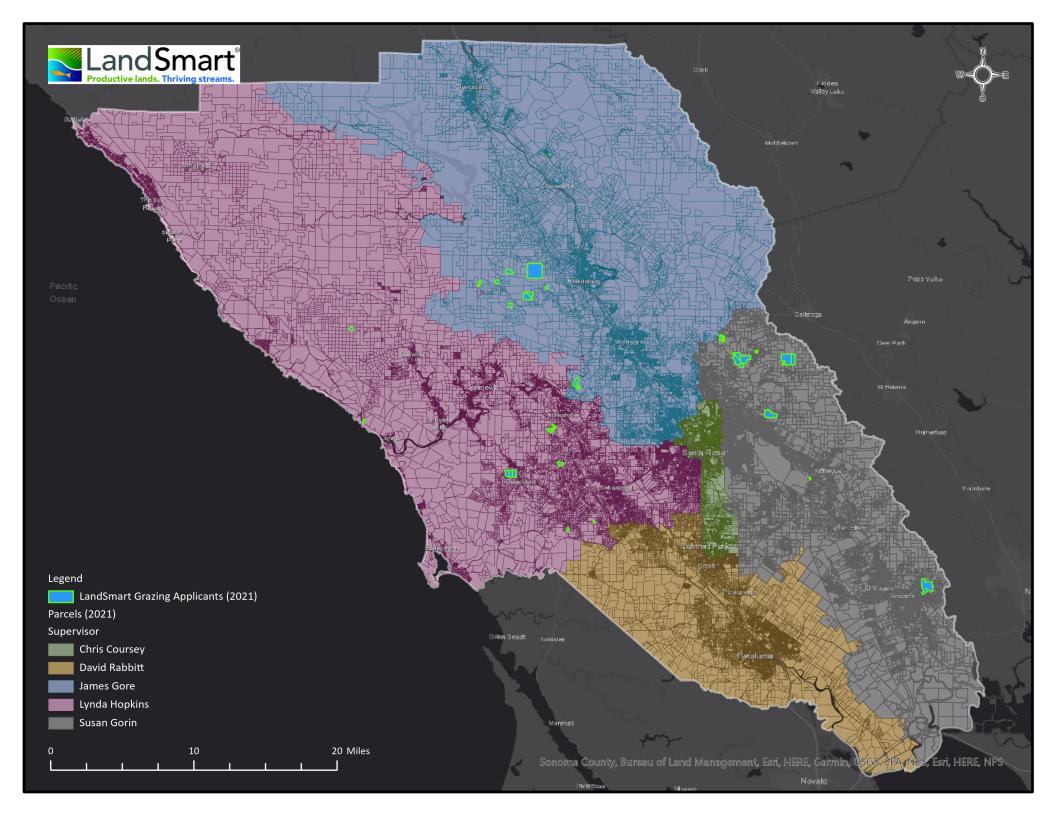

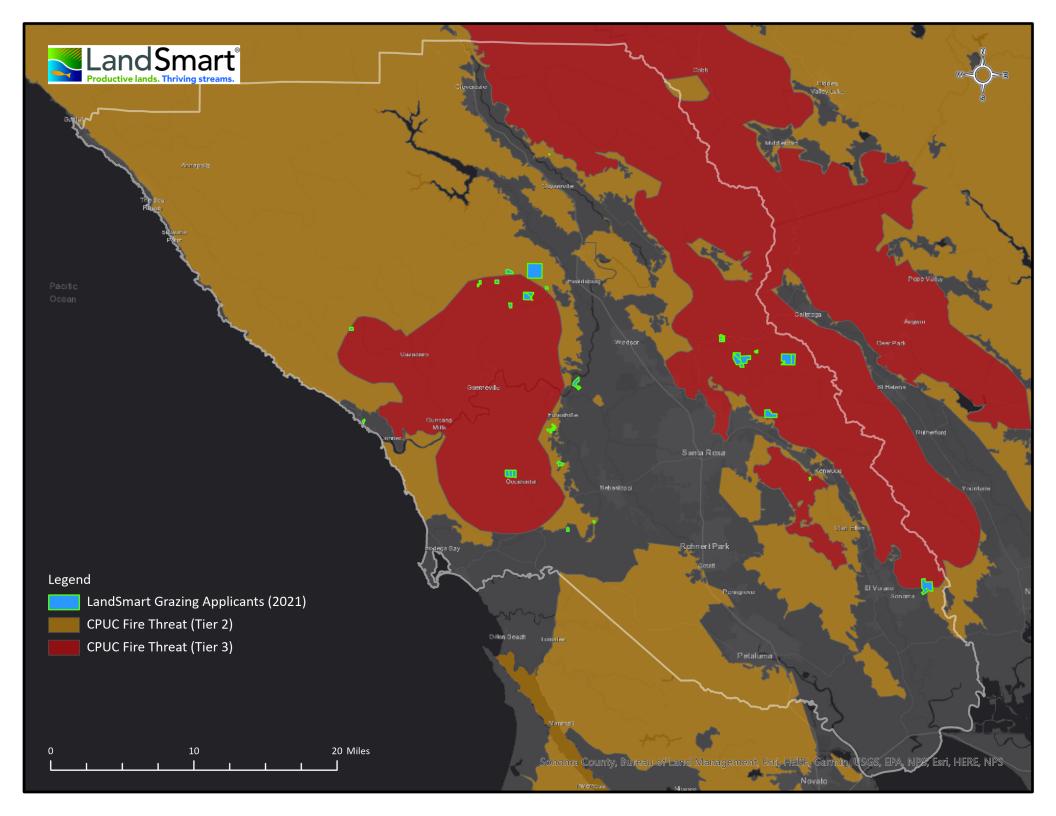

WHEREAS, GRANTEE applied for and has been selected for use of Vegetation Management Grant Program funding; and

WHEREAS, GRANTEE agrees that all expenditures of grant funds provided to it hereunder will be in compliance with this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED by and between the parties hereto as follows:

Agreement

- 1. <u>Grant</u>. Subject to all terms and conditions of this Agreement, COUNTY agrees to grant to GRANTEE Three Hundred and Fifty-Five Thousand Five Hundred and Thirteen Dollars (\$355,513.00) (the "Grant"). The Grant will be issued to GRANTEE as soon as practicable. COUNTY will use reasonable efforts to process this payment request within 14 days of the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- 2. <u>Use of Funds</u>. GRANTEE shall use the Grant exclusively for the uses specified in Exhibit A to this Agreement (the "Grant Project"). The Grant shall be expended for the Grant Project by no later than December 31, 2023 (12/31/2023). Any funds not expended on the Grant Project by such date shall be promptly returned to COUNTY.
- 3. <u>Ineligible Project Costs</u>. The COUNTY, in its sole discretion, shall determine which costs are eligible for the Grant. Without limiting the foregoing, the following are ineligible costs:

 a) costs incurred prior to the award date of the grant; (b) purchase of equipment that is not an integral part of a project; (c) establishing a reserve fund; (d) monitoring and assessment costs for efforts required after project construction is complete; (e) replacement of existing funding sources for ongoing programs; (f) travel expenses, such as transportation and lodging; (g) meal expenses; and (h) overhead not directly related to project costs.

 Mobilization costs for special equipment are not considered travel expenses provided such costs have been approved by COUNTY in advance.

- 4. Reporting. GRANTEE shall submit progress and financial reports to COUNTY every six (6) months. Within thirty (30) days of completion of the Grant Project, GRANTEE shall submit to COUNTY a final report, including photo documentation. Exhibit B provides the narrative monitoring report template to be used for the 6-month report and final report format. A fiscal monitoring template can also be found in Exhibit B which will be modified based on the actual approved budget for this Grant Agreement. The reports shall be in such form and include such information as required by COUNTY. COUNTY reserves the right to request a site visit at any time during the Grant Project or subsequent to completion. Such request may be made at any time within 18 months of the Effective Date of this Agreement, or completion of the work, whichever is later. GRANTEE will provide such access within 10-days of COUNTY's request.
- 5. Records. GRANTEE shall maintain all financial, accounting, and other records related to the Grant Project for no less than five (5) years ("Project Records"). Upon request, GRANTEE shall provide to COUNTY the Project Records. GRANTEE shall report to COUNTY on its use of the Grant at such times and in such manner as may be requested by COUNTY.
- 6. <u>Publicity</u>. Publicity generated by GRANTEE for work funded by this Agreement, shall make reference to the contribution of COUNTY in making the Grant Project possible.
- 7. Indemnification. GRANTEE agrees to accept all responsibility for loss or damage to any person or entity, including COUNTY, and to indemnify, hold harmless, and release COUNTY, its officers, agents, and employees, from and against any actions, claims, damages, liabilities, disabilities, or expenses, that may be asserted by any person or entity, including GRANTEE, that arise out of, pertain to, or related to GRANTEE's or its agents', employees', contractors', subcontractors', or invitees' performance or obligations under this Agreement, the Grant Project, or use of the Grant. GRANTEE's obligations under this Section apply whether or not there is concurrent negligence on COUNTY's part, but to the extent required by law, excluding liability due to COUNTY's conduct. COUNTY shall have the right to select its legal counsel at GRANTEE's expense, subject to GRANTEE's approval, which shall not be unreasonably withheld. This indemnification obligation is not limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages or compensation payable to GRANTEE or its agents under workers' compensation acts, disability benefits acts, or other employee benefit acts. GRANTEE shall be liable to COUNTY for any loss or damage to COUNTY property arising from or in connection with GRANTEE's Grant Project.
- 8. Non-Discrimination. GRANTEE shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations in regard to non-discrimination in employment because of race, ancestry, color, sex, age, national origin, religion, marital status, medical condition, or handicap, including the provisions of Article II of Chapter 19 of the Sonoma County Code, prohibiting discrimination in housing, employment, and services because of AIDS or HIV infection.
- 9. <u>Prevailing Wage</u>. With respect to any portion of the Grant Project that constitutes the performance of a "public work" within the meaning of Labor Code section 1720,

GRANTEE shall comply with all applicable wage and hour laws, including without limitation Labor Code Sections 1775, 1776, 1777.5 1813 and 1815 and California Code of Regulations, Title 8, Section 16000, et seq. GRANTEE shall properly document such compliance, including registration of all covered contracts with the Department of Industrial Regulations. COUNTY shall have the right to inspect all documentation to confirm compliance with this section at any time up to 5 years from project completion.

- 10. <u>ADA Requirements</u>. GRANTEE shall ensure that the Grant Project complies with all applicable requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) including, without limitation, providing fully accessible public access to the property and all facilities and programs provided thereon.
- 11. Breach; Repayment. COUNTY may suspend or terminate this Agreement if GRANTEE fails to comply with the terms of this Agreement, including, but are not limited to: (a) failure of GRANTEE to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement; (b) ineffective or improper use of funds provided under this Agreement; or (c) submission by GRANTEE to COUNTY any application, request, report or other information that is incorrect or incomplete in any material respect. If such event occurs, GRANTEE shall, within ten days of receipt of notice of such failure by COUNTY, return all grant funds provided by COUNTY under this Agreement; provided, however, that COUNTY may, in its sole discretion, allow GRANTEE to retain some or all grant funds if COUNTY determines that the failure was inadvertent or immaterial, or that GRANTEE has taken action to ensure that the failure will not reoccur.
- 12. <u>Termination</u>. At any time, with or without cause, COUNTY shall have the right in its sole discretion to terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to GRANTEE. In the event of a termination without cause, COUNTY shall pay GRANTEE for eligible Grant Project activities performed in compliance with this Agreement prior to the notice of termination.
- 13. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. GRANTEE covenants that it presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest, direct, or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of its services hereunder. GRANTEE further covenants that in the performance of this contract no person having any such interest shall be employed.
- 14. <u>Statutory Compliance</u>. GRANTEE agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, regulations, statutes and policies applicable to the Grant, the Grant Project and any work funded by the Grant, or otherwise provided under this Agreement as they exist now and as they are changed, amended or modified during the term of this Agreement. It is the sole responsibility of GRANTEE, not COUNTY, to obtain any required approvals, permits and documentation necessary to legally complete the Grant Project. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, GRANTEE expressly acknowledges that this Agreement may be subject to the provisions of Article XXVI of Chapter 2 of the Sonoma County Code, requiring payment of a living wage to covered employees. Noncompliance during the term of the Agreement will be considered a material breach and may result in termination of the Agreement or pursuit of other legal or administrative remedies.

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, COUNTY shall be responsible for reviewing and adopting documentation necessary for making CEQA findings as the lead agency for GRANTEE's project. GRANTEE shall be responsible for securing all necessary permits and providing COUNTY with any necessary technical information required for CEQA compliance.

- 15. <u>AIDS Discrimination</u>. GRANTEE agrees to comply with the provisions of Chapter 19, Article II, of the Sonoma County Code prohibiting discrimination in housing, employment, and services because of AIDS or HIV infection during the term of this Agreement and any extensions of the term.
- 16. <u>Assignment</u>. GRANTEE shall not assign, sublet, transfer or delegate any interest in or duty under this Agreement without written consent of COUNTY, and no assignment shall be of any force or effect whatsoever unless and until so consented.
- 17. Merger. This writing is intended both as the final expression of the agreement between the parties hereto with respect to the included terms and as a complete and exclusive statement of the terms of the Agreement, pursuant to C.C.P. Section 1856. No modification of this Agreement shall be effective unless and until such modification is evidenced by a writing signed by both parties.
- 18. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to create and the parties do not intend to create any rights in third parties.
- 19. Extra or Changed Work. Extra or changed work or other changes to the Agreement may be authorized only by written amendment to this Agreement, signed by both parties. GRANTEE expressly recognizes that, pursuant to Sonoma County Code Section 1-11, COUNTY personnel are without authorization to order extra or changed work or waive Agreement requirements.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Gold Ridge and Sonoma RCDs propose to implement phase two of the LandSmart Grazing Program. This is a continued demonstration community grazing project funded by the Ag + Open Space District's Vegetation Management Grant Program in 2021. This project supports interested neighbors or community groups to utilize grazing to reduce fuel load and make their communities safer in the face of wildfires. We believe exposure to this type of vegetation management and community support of grazing will add a cost effective and needed tool to manage vegetation not only to reduce fire risks but also to improve biodiversity and manage vegetation in a more carbon beneficial manner. This project also continues to serve previously burned properties for invasive weed removal and fuel load reduction in preparation for future post-fire recovery activities. The continued project builds upon knowledge gained during the pilot project that is currently being implemented providing valuable information on how to make the program work including an expansion of grazers working with the RCDs and knowledge of several additional landowners who wish to be involved in the program.

The LandSmart Grazing Program will become a model for future grazing opportunities for landowners after fires and become part of the RCD's arsenal for assisting with both fire resilient vegetation management and post-fire activities. The RCDs will solicit interest and support community groups to work with contract grazers to support community targeted grazing.

Locations for grazing support will be throughout Sonoma County. Applications will be prioritized by the high fire risk areas where there is a close proximity to at-risk, densely populated, tribal affiliation or underserved communities. We will also be using the newly developed CWPP Project Ranking Tool.

Priority areas will be targeted for outreach as we aim to support multi-beneficial projects in the areas most vulnerable to wildfire. There is an inclusive and transparent selection process on what land participants and grazers will receive support.

LandSmart Grazing is a rebate program, where the selected land participants contract with a grazer for services and the RCD reimburses them. We will reimburse applicants up to 85% of contract grazing fees or up to \$20,000 per applicant. To increase the project's inclusivity, we request cost share on a sliding scale. Our goal is to cover 50-80% of the cost of the contract grazing. Participants may request 100% of costs to be covered if need is described.

The RCDs will file a CEQA Notice of Exemption for each site funded in this project. No other permits are anticipated.

BENEFIT AND SUCCESS OF PROJECT

Our goal is to support land participants with long term grazing to address fuel loads in areas that can't be treated by other methods. Prescribed herbivory grazing for one year can make a measurable impact to fuel load reduction but that impact has a limited time span. We believe that there is an opportunity to build upon an existing, trained labor force of contract grazers who are stretched in responding to the escalating threat of catastrophic wildfires. While a goal of this project is that project participants will have increased comfort and incentive to pursue future grazing, it may be cost prohibitive for some. In order to address the need for sustainable vegetative treatment and to stimulate the generational shift towards management of our landscape, we will 1) provide technical assistance and educational resources to landowners about community supported grazing; 2) provide mini-grants to increase contract grazers capacity to offer grazing services within Sonoma County; 3) support jobs that are in demand and will continue to be over the coming decades.

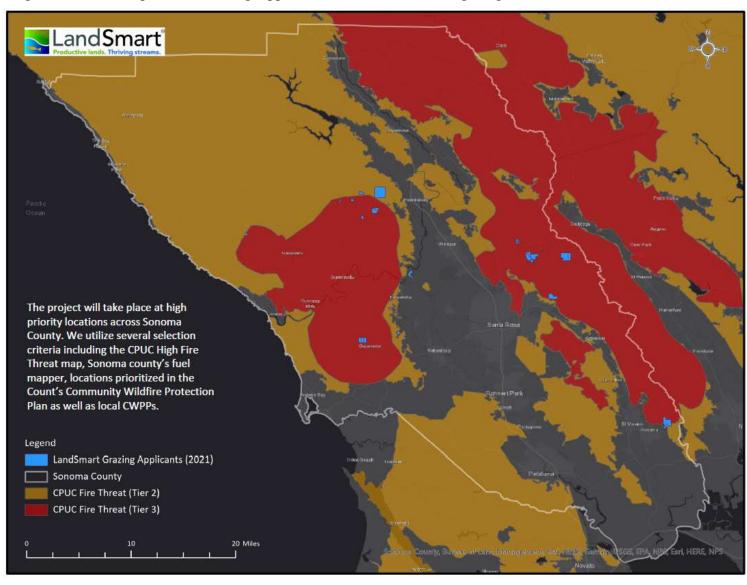


Exhibit 1: High Fire Threat Map – 2021 Grazing Applicants – LandSmart Grazing Program Phase II
